

Transfer Guide Secondary Education Hesston College

The Curriculum & Teaching Department at KU offers three teacher education programs for students interested in being licensed in secondary education. This guide will provide information about the Secondary Level English, History & Government, and Foreign Language teacher education programs available for students. The KU School of Education and Human Sciences also partners with various departments at KU to provide additional undergraduate teacher education program options. Please check the program websites often as additional information is frequently added.

Benefits of the program include:

- **Program Reputation** KU's Bachelor's Degree in Secondary Education is offered through the KU School of Education and Human Sciences, which is ranked among the top 10 Best Public Education Schools according to *U.S. News & World Report*.
- Field Experiences, Early & Often The teacher education program combines general education courses and professional education coursework with multiple field experiences at the secondary level in rural, urban, and suburban communities.
- **Dual Programming** Coursework fulfills the requirements for a Bachelor's degree as well as initial teaching licensure in Kansas. **Teacher Licensure Options** Students who successfully complete this program at KU may be eligible to take advantage of licensure endorsements options: TESOL or Special Education.
- **Nationally-accredited Program** The KU School of Education and Human Sciences is accredited under the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) Standards through the CAEP Accreditation System.

This transfer guide provides important information and a sample two-semester plan for a student starting at Hesston College and transferring to KU for the remaining coursework. In addition, we provide additional courses a student may choose to take at the community college prior to transferring to KU. Students are advised to consider transferring by spring of sophomore year, at the latest. Secondary Education Admission Requirements

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Step One: Admission to the University of Kansas

Apply to the University of Kansas by filling out a transfer application at <u>admissions.ku.edu</u>. Gaining admission to the University of Kansas requires the submission of official college transcripts from all previously attended colleges/universities.

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Step Two: Admission to the KU School of Education and Human Sciences

Select "School of Education and Human Sciences" as your school and "Secondary Education" as the degree you will be pursuing. Students should have a 2.75 KU + Transfer Cumulative GPA to be considered for admission.

Additional Notes for Transfer Students

The Secondary English education program mixes literature-based theory and knowledge with culturally rich readings and discussions. Courses taught by the English Department offer students learning options in rhetoric, linguistics, and literature.

Courses offered at your community college that are equivalent to MATH 101 or MATH 104, or higher (excluding statistics) satisfy this requirement. See KU advisor or CredTran for available courses.

- While additional courses have been included on this transfer guide it should be noted that due to prerequisites and course offerings if a student spends two years at a community college, the student may still have three years of courses to complete once at KU.
- Transfer credits with earned grades of D+ and below will not satisfy graduation requirements, but will be included in the transfer GPA. If a student takes a course and then repeats it at the same institution, KU will honor the course repeat policy in effect at the institution issuing the transcript.
- A bachelor's degree must include 120 completed credit hours. A student may apply a maximum of 64 credit hours of community college coursework to a KU degree.
- Transfer courses may be matched to a course of opposite level at KU, but the level of credit is defined by the originating institution. (All community college courses are lower level.)

It is the STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITY to check for updates to all transfer information. This transfer program is provided as a service and is updated annually. Degree requirements are subject to change.
